They had to deal with two incidents in short succession on Saturday afternoon. One swimmer was pulled from the water unconscious and couldn't be revived. The patrol only had minutes to regroup after that to deal with a shark alarm and evacuate hundreds of swimmers from the water. I was impressed but not surprised to see the professional and manner in which the patrolling members responded.

I returned to Sawtell to hear news of the incidents on our beach over the break as you will read in Steve's report. Our patrolling members put so much effort into maintaining their skills and knowledge to be able to apply them with competence and confidence when they are needed. I want to acknowledge and thank the patrolling members who were involved over the weekend – for being there when they were needed, for going the extra mile and committing to an extra hour of patrolling. I'm relieved there were no adverse outcomes and super proud to have you as members of our club. Well done to all.

We are excited to welcome Duncan and Leesa Elliot as the new licence holders of the surf club café which will be opening soon. The club members and the community are all looking forward to seeing the café back in action again. A small team of people from the club have been overseeing essential work to get the space in shape for handover. I particularly want to thank Rob Lyons for the many hours he spent in coordinating contractors, and liaising with other member and community contributors (not to mention the work done by Rob) to get the place looking spick and span. It will be wonderful to see that hub of café activity happening around our club again and I'm sure you will join me in wishing the Elliots well in their new venture.

Message from Club Captain

The extent of our commitment to keeping the public safe in the ocean at Sawtell, and the value of that commitment, was starkly demonstrated by the events of the recent Easter long weekend. During the weekend a total of 73 patrol members on 8 patrols undertook in excess of 300 hours on the beach looking after the public. The conditions were at times quite ordinary meaning that the patrols had to be ever vigilant. We performed two rescues with Barry Walker's Patrol 9 undertaking one using an IRB on Friday afternoon and Shannon Wilson's Patrol 2 undertaking one by rescue board after normal patrol hours on Sunday afternoon. The victim on Sunday afternoon was in quite a bad way so the patrol administered oxygen therapy and an ambulance was called. Luckily for the victim the patrol had got to him before he inhaled water into his lungs so transport to hospital was not required. The victim's wife, mother and father were all present on the beach during the rescue and observed the Patrol's rescue and first aid treatment and the ambulance treatment of their husband and son. You can imagine their relief and gratitude for the efforts of our patrol members. We have subsequently received a very nice email from the mother (see page 3).

It wasn't just luck that the patrol was available to perform this rescue after hours as they had deliberately decided to extend the patrol hours due to the number of people in the water and the conditions of the day. Congratulations to Patrol 2. A great result.

As this rescue occurred after hours the Sawtell Emergency Surf Rescue Call Out Team was also activated by SurfCom which resulted in another 3 very experienced club members attending to assist the patrol if required. All of these members arrived well before the ambulance. The Sawtell Call Out Team was also activated by SurfCom on Monday at 5:25 pm with another person caught in a rip at Sawtell. 6 of our members attended the beach on this occasion as did a Council Life Guard. Fortunately the person managed to get out of the rip unaided.

The patrol season is rapidly drawing to a close with only 9 more days to go. That means that most patrols only have one more patrol to do although those who missed out over the Easter Weekend still have 2 to do.

Next Sunday morning we are providing water safety and first aid for the Coffs Ocean Swims. This is a great opportunity to assist the club with fund raising as we always get a substantial donation from the organisers of the event. The size of the donation is contingent upon the number of our members who assist on that day so please

attend if possible. Can you please text either Scott or me if you can assist?

The end of the patrol season marks the start of the IRB Crewperson course which will be followed immediately after by the IRB Driver Course. These are really essential skills for our patrols as we cannot patrol without a fully operational IRB with every patrol so I would like to encourage all Bronze members to consider doing these courses. To be eligible to undertake the Crewpersons course you must have a Bronze Medallion and be proficient. To be eligible to do the Drivers course you must be a crewperson and be at least 17 years old at the date of assessment. Both courses are a lot of fun with the emphasis being on practical skills. The IRB training team is champing at the bit waiting for the course to start!

The IRB crewpersons course will commence **7am Sun 29 April** at SAWTELL. As the Club Championships will also be on the 29th the IRB course will finish on this day at 10:00am to enable members to compete in the club championships. Members must advise of commitment prior to that date.

INJURIES

If you have suffered an illness or injury while performing authorised surf lifesaving activities, Workers Compensation may be payable under the Workers Compensation (Bush Fire, Emergency and Rescue Services) Act 1987.

Such injury must be immediately recorded in the Incident Log Book and the necessary paperwork for Workcover purposes submitted within 48 hours.

As the extent of the injury may not be immediately apparent it is best to lodge the paperwork just in case.

The engineer is in the process of preparing plans for such rectification work with the aim of having work undertaken outside kiosk hours. The Club apologises for any inconvenience but safety is our main concern.
