

Message from Club Captain

As the competition season is approaching its peak with County Titles a while ago, the Branch carnival at Sawtell and State now occurring it's really pleasing to see how well all our competitors are going. They are a real credit to themselves, the coaches and the club. Congratulations to all. Apart from the obvious benefits of competing in carnivals one of the key benefits is that the skills competitors gain in training for events is that those skills are highly useful during patrols. The surf swimmers, board paddling and even IRB skills enhanced doing water safety for nippers, training or competition all lead to great patrol members.

Whilst so far this season we have only conducted a small number of rescues the situation up and down the coast is terrible with the

number of drownings, mostly of visitors to Australia, appallingly high. The simple message of swim only between the flags is simply not getting through to enough people. We must continue to spread this message. So much of what we do is simply putting the flags in the safest position on the beach and ensuring that swimmers stay between the flags. Alternatively, if conditions are just too dangerous as was the case on the weekend of 23 and 24 February, closing the beach to all swimmers and advising the public of this is a great way to keep people safe.

One of our patrols was caught short of members on Saturday 16 February due to a combination of factors including the patrol captain being sent away as part of the emergency response to significant bushfires. I would like to thank all those who stepped

in to make sure that the patrol was operational on that day either by doing subs, volunteer patrols or by moving their normal rostered patrol to this time slot. This willingness by our patrolling members to help other patrols is one of the strengths of our club and one which makes my job as Club Captain rewarding.

The patrol season is now 75% over with patrols only having 3 or 4 patrols to complete. With the water being absolutely beautiful





at the moment on a balmy 25°C or so we are still getting large numbers to the beach on the sunny days. This will be especially

so over Easter at the end of March and during the school holidays in April. It remains vitally important that all members attend patrols or, if they cannot, they obtain substitutes for their patrols.

I would like to thank all the Sawtell people who assisted with Water Safety and First Aid at the bcuTri last Saturday and Sunday. We outnumbered the other SLS clubs by a large margin. A special thanks to the IRB folk who managed to get all the swim cans out on Sunday for an early start to the swim after assembling at the Jetty Beach in the dark so that they could hit the water at first light.

In a way the bcu Tri is a practice run for the much bigger Coffs Ocean Swims to be held on **Sunday 7 April**. We will need a bigger contingent of helpers

on that day. Both these events are good money earners for the club and it's a good opportunity for those who don't do much other work around the Club to do a bit to help the club's finances.
